UCLA Philharmonia accompanies a newly-restored version of Edward Curtis' landmark 1914 silent film *In the Land of the Headhunters* with its original score by John Braham at the Getty Center's Harold M. Williams Auditorium. This was the first motion picture to exclusively star indigenous North Americans from Kwakwaka'wakw communities in British Columbia. This collaborative project involving the Getty Research Institute, UCLA Film and Television Archives, Field Museum of Natural History and U'Mista Cultural Society in British Columbia is part of a Getty Institute symposium entitled "Documents of an Encounter," exploring the connections between the history and culture of the Kwakwaka'wakw people of British Columbia, Curtis' film and Braham's score. It will also feature a Kwakwaka'wakw performance of traditional dance.

Music and Justice Part II: Righteousness and Bravery: A Concert for Sugihara

A co-presentation of the UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music, the Lowell Milken Center for Music of American Jewish Experience and the American Friends of Yad Vashem, "Righteousness and Bravery: A Concert for Sugihara" features the West Coast premiere of Symphony No. 6 ("Vessels of Light"), a 40' work for cello, chorus and orchestra by acclaimed Soviet-born Jewish Austrian-American composer [Lera Auerbach](#) (b. 1973). Commissioned by Yad Vashem/The World Holocaust Remembrance Center and The American Society for Yad Vashem, the symphony commemorates the heroism of [Chiune Sugihara](#), the Japanese diplomat who clandestinely saved thousands of Jews during World War II from his post in Kaunas, Lithuania, and is dedicated to Sugihara "and all those who risk everything to save others." This searingly expressive work features Yiddish texts adapted from poetry by Yisroel Emyot, Dovid Hofshetyn, Peretz Markish, Itzik Manger, Simkha Shayevitch, Avrom Sutzkever, Moyshe Teyf and Rajzel Zychlinski. "Vessels of Light" has recently received European premiere performances in Kaunas and Prague, and will receive its U.S. premiere at Carnegie Hall on April 19. The cello soloist will be [Kristina Reiko Cooper](#), who initiated the project and whose husband's family was among those saved by Sugihara.
